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About the SARC

School Description

Parkway is a comprehensive middle school in La Mesa for grades 7-8. Our 810 students are known as Parkway Patriots. We have a strong tradition of academic excellence coupled with a school wide focus on kindness to others and community service. Parkway teachers work in Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) by subject areas: language arts, math, history, science, special education, physical education and unified arts. Together, each PLC provides many activities to promote the academic and social/emotional growth of all students. Each department PLC works together to ensure student success and offers intervention and enrichment opportunities. Additionally, each department PLC team meets weekly to discuss students' academic successes and needs, review assessment data and share best practices for daily instruction. The core content areas (language arts, math, history, and science) are supported by physical education, yearlong electives (band, Spanish, yearbook, ASB and media), and one semester cycle classes (forensics, journalism, technology, art, and music exploration). A strong PACE Program (Programs for Acceleration, Challenge and Enrichment) for gifted identified students includes cluster classes in language arts and leveled math classes. Intervention classes in language arts and math offer support for students needing extra time to learn. English Language Development (ELD) classes are offered for our students who are second language learners to support them in learning English. Flex Literacy reading support is offered for students reading below grade level and focuses on fluency, comprehension and vocabulary development. Common Core State Standards are implemented in math and language arts to better prepare students for California Common Core State Testing in the 18-19 school year. Science classes implement Next Generation Science Standards through hands on activities and inquiry learning. Our counselor provides additional class lessons in social skills, study skills, goal setting and organization. Students enjoy participating in Builders Club, a community service club, and learn lifelong skills through our ASB leadership class. Parkway also offers morning Homework Club, Tuesday through Friday from 8:00-8:55am. At Homework Club students receive free tutoring for all subject areas. A Parkway math teacher attends Homework Club each day to provide specific tutoring for 7th and 8th grade math concepts.

Parkway Middle School Mission: To address the unique needs of the early adolescent, Parkway Middle School provides high standards of academic instruction and social-emotional growth in settings that promote kindness to others, personal commitment, and success.

At Parkway Middle School, parents are our partners in the education of students. Communication is our watchword and there are a variety of ways we promote this. Parents may communicate with teachers daily through email or Jupiter Grades. Every teacher has voice mail and email. ConnectEd "all call" phone calls, newsletters, and report cards are other vehicles to support strong communication between home and school. Our daily news broadcast, website, monthly calendar, and information hotline keep everyone current on the events and daily activities at school. We also have Twitter and Instagram for updates on activities. Parents are welcome in the classrooms, as office helpers, and at all celebrations. There are many opportunities through parent/teacher conferences, Back-To-School Night and Open House when parents are involved on campus. Parent education nights often include the whole family. Parkway PTSA is active in supporting programs and clubs by providing resources and materials. Our School Site Council (SSC) is comprised of elected parents, students and staff representatives who meet throughout the year to oversee the school improvement program. Our English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC) made up of parents and Parkway's principal, work together to ensure there are opportunities for parents and students who are second language learners. ELAC gives input on instructional practices and budget expenditures to ensure English learner students are supported in learning English in all of their classes. Campus Tours are provided and the principal believes in an "open-door" policy. We want parents to know their children are in good hands. In response to student performance data and classroom observation, current professional learning focuses on aligning instruction to standards and student experience, with extra time and resources dedicated to mathematics and English learners. Additional professional development continues to address professional learning communities, curriculum adoptions, differentiation, special education, NGSS and effective integration of technology into instruction.

With professional learning communities as a foundation, professional development is approached from multiple angles to ensure that it is relevant, timely, and targeted to both student and teacher needs. Teachers meet weekly, as a grade level or discipline, to analyze student data and discuss best practices to address the needs of each and every student. The district offers workshops and multiple-day seminars, after-school workshops, and one-on-one coaching and modeling. Professional development was offered 67 days in the 2016-17 school year and 63 days in 2017-18 school year. Professional development is being offered 74 days in the 2018-2019 school year. District staff also partners with principals providing professional development at site learning days and staff meetings. Select teachers also attend conferences and workshops offered through outside agencies.
