## **Surveys**

This section provides a description of surveys (i.e., Student, Parent, Teacher) used during the school-year, and a summary of results from the survey(s).

Our school's comprehensive needs assessment included the solicitation of input and feedback from our educational partners (parents, teachers, staff, etc.). Our 2021-22 Annual Parent Survey was distributed to gather data regarding the climate and safety of the school and to solicit input about the strengths and areas for growth of the many programs and services we offer. Data from these surveys is included throughout our 2022-23 SPSA.

Consultations and connections with our educational partners took place through virtual Zoom meetings, in-person meetings, online surveys, phone conversations, and student home visits (when possible) and allowed us to assess our educational program, academic interventions, social-emotional and behavioral supports, parent engagement, and school connectedness.

As our 2021-22 school year began, our first priority was to ensure the safety of our learning community, technology needs, and to provide food and resources to our families. As such, our first surveys revolved around the basic needs of our students and their families. Once those basic needs were addressed, subsequent surveys were distributed.

Surveys sent in preparation for or during the 2021-22 school year included (but were not limited to) topics such as :

- Staff/Parent Quarantine Questions/Concerns
- Student Technology Needs
- Student/Family Community Resources Needs
- Staff Technology Needs
- School Communication and English Learner Program
- School Climate and Safety

#### Parent data indicated:

- Parents want more information regarding the English Learner progression from beginning to redesignation
- · Safety at pick up and drop off in front of school is a concern

Teacher data displayed the desire for more training and direction in GLAD techniques, ELD/SLD. All educational partners shared comments about the safety needed if COVID cases started to increase.

The Extended School Services (ESS) program is housed on our campus and provides before and after school childcare in an academic and recreational setting. ESS also distributed parent surveys to participating families at our school site. The survey provides a method of monitoring needs and strengths of the program. Results are shared with all ESS employees and action plans are developed and put in place to address growth opportunities.

Our school will continue to solicit input and feedback from our educational partners during the 2022-23 school year and utilize the data to improve the work that we are doing in support of our students, families, and staff.

#### Classroom Observations

Through Professional Learning Communities, teachers analyze both state yearly assessments and district benchmark assessments taken at specific intervals throughout the year. Teachers set goals and modify adopted curriculum and instruction to address students' needs in both classroom instruction and Response to Intervention (RTI) groupings and topics.

Use of data to monitor student progress on curriculum-embedded assessments and modify instruction (EPC)

Teachers use curriculum-embedded unit, weekly, and daily assessments to monitor student progress toward mastering grade level standards. Formative assessments lead to modifications in instruction to meet the needs of students.

## **Staffing and Professional Development**

Status of meeting requirements for highly qualified staff (ESEA)

Staff at our school site meet the requirements for being highly qualified.

Sufficiency of credentialed teachers and teacher professional development (e.g., access to instructional materials training on SBE-adopted instructional materials) (EPC)

All teachers and counselors at our school site are properly credentialed.

All teachers will participate in site-based staff development that takes place 1-2 times a month. We believe that building teacher capacity needs to be systematic and collaborative. Professional development is supported with daily interactions with and feedback from the principal. Individuals and collaborative teams identify areas of focus based on student need and site priorities which include: English and Spanish Development, increased Reading comprehension in both Fiction and non-fiction text in both English and Spanish, and increased proficiency in writing in both English and Spanish.

Teachers will be offered access to professional development offered by the county office of education or other appropriate providers at Principal's discretion.

Additionally, teachers can participate in district offerings to supplement site professional development. Teachers are currently afforded the opportunity to participate in professional development online, face-to-face, and blended professional development. Professional development courses have included:

Regardless of the learning format, our educators are eager to engage in professional development, and the District is committed to providing them with many tools, strategies, and training to support all learning models.

Alignment of staff development to content standards, assessed student performance, and professional needs (ESEA)

Staff development is provided to teachers and other staff to address the identified needs of our students. Areas of need are identified by student achievement data, stakeholder input, and observed areas of need. Growth and improvement are measured through principal classroom walkthrough data and student performance. Needs assessments and feedback are elicited in conjunction with each professional growth offering. Based on the feedback, professional growth is adjusted to increase effectiveness. The District is intentional about providing a through line of professional learning that targets the professional growth of new teachers, developing teachers, teacher leaders, new administrators, and veteran administrators.

All staff development is focused on:

- Cultural proficiency and educational equity
- Use of local assessments to inform and modify instruction
- California Common Core State Standards (CCSS) in English-Language Arts and Literacy in History-Social Studies, Mathematics, and Science (Next Generation Science Standards-NGSS)
- California English Language Development (ELD) Standards
- Implementation of the 5D Framework for High-Quality Teaching and Learning
- Development of strong PLCs
- · Research-based classroom instruction and best practices

Site level professional development includes site learning day presentations and PLC work. Teachers work collaboratively to plan instruction based on essential standards, reflect on lessons, and analyze student work and assessment data, to improve their practice and increase student achievement. Staff development at our school site in the 2022-23 school year will focus on Comprehension of non-fiction text and writing for understanding ie., summarization, and Cornell note taking.

Ongoing instructional assistance and support for teachers (e.g., use of content experts and instructional coaches) (EPC)

Site-based professional development, grade-level collaboration, principal observation, and feedback /coaching, IDS teacher support, provide on-going assistance and capacity building for teachers. (Response to Intervention support (Resource Teacher, Teachers on Special Assignment, and Special Education support staff) all support classroom instruction.

Teacher collaboration by grade level (kindergarten through grade eight [K–8]) and department (grades nine through twelve) (EPC)

Each grade-level/department at our school has regularly scheduled meetings to collaborate on the analysis of data, lesson design, and the use of instructional strategies and best practices that work to improve student achievement and performance. Each meeting is designed in professional learning community (PLC) format where each member takes a leadership role and an expectation of reflective conversations surround data analysis, program effectiveness, and "moving the needle" toward student success and achievement. Professional learning communities allow for an ongoing process in which educators work collaboratively in recurring cycles of collective inquiry and action research to achieve better results for the students they serve. Professional learning communities operate under the assumption that the key to improved learning for students is continuous jobembedded learning for educators.

## **Teaching and Learning**

Alignment of curriculum, instruction, and materials to content and performance standards (ESEA) Following the state adoption cycles, the district-provided curriculum materials and instruction are in alignment with the California Content Standards.

Adherence to recommended instructional minutes for reading/language arts and mathematics (K–8) (EPC)

Instructional minutes in all subject areas are monitored by the District. All teachers turn in their classroom schedule to school administration to ensure adherence to the District guidelines.

Lesson pacing schedule (K–8) and master schedule flexibility for sufficient numbers of intervention courses (EPC)

Essential Standards in math and language arts provide a framework for lesson pacing. All students have a copy of each textbook and/or workbook for core curriculum. Student daily schedules are modified to allow for intervention as needed.

Availability of standards-based instructional materials appropriate to all student groups (ESEA)

Each classroom and student has easy access to adopted curriculum assigned to them in all content areas. The adoption of instructional materials process includes a preview to determine that they are appropriate for the student groups for whom they are purchased.

Use of SBE-adopted and standards-aligned instructional materials, including intervention materials, and for high school students, access to standards-aligned core courses (EPC)

All students have State Board of Education adopted materials for their courses, intervention materials (when needed), and access to standards-aligned core courses. Use of materials is monitored by school administration on a daily basis.

## **Opportunity and Equal Educational Access**

Services provided by the regular program that enable underperforming students to meet standards (ESEA)

All students receive Common Core standards-based instruction at their appropriate grade level. In classrooms, teachers provide additional access to the curriculum through small group instruction. In ELD classes, students are grouped by Language level, and are assessed and regrouped appropriately. Teachers are required to examine student work samples and meet in subject specific and/or department-level meetings to ensure that students are mastering standards. They also determine student needs, adjust instruction, and plan re-instruction accordingly. Intervention action plans are developed when appropriate. The Student Study Team process is used to identify and monitor students at risk. Interventions are agreed upon and implemented by the classroom teacher in collaboration with the student's family.

Evidence-based educational practices to raise student achievement

Information from state assessments (when available), common assessments, benchmark assessments, needs assessments and surveys, and staff development provide the basis for School Site Council and administrative planning. The use of data to modify and drive instruction with effective evidence-based instructional strategies is our major focus to raise student achievement.

All educational partners (parents, community members, teachers, and other school personnel) have an opportunity to give input on the use of federal funds (as applicable) and the implementation of programs. Specifically, at our school site, the members of School Site Council (SSC) and English Language Advisory Council (ELAC) meet to discuss these matters directly with each other. The District holds monthly stakeholder meetings with parents (DELAC and District Advisory Committee (DAC) where district programs are discussed. In addition, the District holds meetings throughout the year with other stakeholder groups (classified staff, certificated staff, administrative staff) to obtain input about district programs.

#### Funding

Services provided by categorical funds that enable underperforming students to meet standards (ESEA)

Title 1 funds will be used to hire one full time bilingual reading intervention teacher and partially fund an 80% Reading Specialist.

Title I Parent Engagement funds will be used to offer additional family support (resources, education, counseling/community referrals) provided by a credentialed social worker.

#### Fiscal support (EPC)

Our school receives Title I money based on the number of pupils in our school who qualify for free and reduced meals.

## Involvement Process for the SPSA and Annual Review and Update

Feedback and input from key educational partner groups are critical for the ongoing success of our students. As part of the planning process for the 2022-23 School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA), school leadership met with the School Site Council (SSC) and the English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC). Achievement data (local and state, if available) was shared with these groups and analyzed for trends and patterns of under-performance. That analysis is summarized in the SPSA as the Annual Review for each goal.

- 1. Student enrollment decreased slightly in Kindergarten and third grade.
- 2. Total student enrollment has increased over the last three years as the district has opened up enrollment by one grade level each year.

#### The conclusions based on this data

- 1. While the number of students who are English Learners has increased from 18-19 to 19-20 and decreased by one from 19-20 to 20-21, the percentage of students has decreased as we have added a new grade level each year increasing the overall enrollment at Kempton.
- 2. The percentage of Fluent English proficient students again increased from 18-19 to 19-20 and decreased from 19-20 to 20-21. This, too, has been affected by the increase in the number of grade levels attending Kempton.
- Fewer students have been reclassified over the last three years. Students left school in March of 2020 due to Covid quarantine and were in distance learning for the majority of the 2020-2021 school year. Distance learning impacted students' English language acquisition. Student instruction with a teacher was decreased, students' ability to interact with peers in English decreased, and we saw an overall decrease in EL students English acquisition.

- We see a dip in the overall mean scores in grades K-2 between yrs. 18-19 and 2020-21. We attribute this decline in students being home for the 2019-2020 school year and distance learning. While ELD was provided during distance learning, the difficulties of on-line learning ie., sporadic attendance, distractions, and varying levels of parental support may have affected the scores of our youngest students.
- 2. Overall mean scores of our third grade student did increase from 18-19 to 2020-21 and the 2020-2021 scores of our 4th and 5th graders were higher than our primary grade students. Older students faired better with distance learning. They were more engaged, participated more, and interacted with peers in a more effective way while online.

Site learning days, district trainings and staff meetings were devoted to developing strong professional learning communities. Grade level teachers met every Tuesday to review data, create formative assessments and discuss the continued progress of students.

iReady data was made available to staff and Site learning days were devoted to the disaggregation of said data by the grade level professional learning teams. La Mesa Spring Valley essential standards were reviewed and teams were given a teaching/ assessing cycle worksheet to be used to tie in the standards with their daily instruction.

Our Instruction and Data Support Teacher worked throughout the year with our 6th, 5th, 4th and 2nd grade teams. Through the student centered coaching cycle, she coached teachers in planning and implementing standards based instruction in Math, Social Studies, ELA and Writing.

Our site developed a common language using the 5 dimension of Teaching and Learning. Classroom walk-throughs were conducted on a weekly basis to observe teaching and student engagement.

The schedule of our 50/50 dual language program was changed from 50% of a day in English and 50% of a day in Spanish to alternating days of English and Spanish. This schedule provided teachers with more class time to provide small group intervention of the targeted language, in the classroom setting.

Students were provided with tier 3 intervention by our full time, bilingual intervention teacher and our 80% reading specialist. Each teacher saw 72 students a day providing intervention and support to students 2 or more grade levels below their current grade level. Groups were formed based on assessment results and specific skills were targeted based on students need. The focus of these groups included:

English: Phonics and decoding, letter sound correspondence, sentence structure, grammar, fluency, and sight words.

Spanish: Phonics and decoding, Beginning sounds, blending, syllables, fluency, words and sentence structure.

Lexia Core 5 was also provided to support students in their reading.

4 teachers provided after school tutoring to students 2 or more grade levels below their current reading level. These groups average 10 students per teacher.

All designated EL students were provided 30 minutes or more of English Language Development daily. ELD instruction included increasing student talk, routines, and vocabulary. ELD at Kempton is both designated and integrated into daily lessons. Student progress is monitored and a report is sent to parents with each report card. Catch up plans are done yearly and results are used to develop differentiated instruction for students and monitor student progress. Plans are shared with parents during parent conferences.

Staff participated in professional develop around equity, and the guiding principles, barriers, essential elements and the continuum of Cultural Proficiency.

Students with IEPs received services through a combination of pull out and push in with a specialized academic instruction professional. SAI teachers ensured that students received appropriate services targeted to meet individual student needs. SAI and Gen Ed staff met to articulate, plan and review student progress. Data from SBAC and iReady was used to determine placement in intensive intervention programs as well as to determine who would attend tier 2 intervention classes with our two intervention teachers.

Budgets and planned expenditures were explained and discussed to all who attended the meeting.

School Site Council (SSC)and English Language Advisory Council (ELAC) elections were held. All parents were invited to nominate themselves for membership. All stakeholders (parents and staff) are invited to each meeting. 4 ELAC meetings and 5 SSC meetings were held throughout the year. A representative was sent to district level meetings.

Family Reading Fridays were reinstated beginning in April with an attendance of approx. 80-100 parents in attendance each month. The school may include data voluntarily developed by districts to measure pupil outcomes (described in the Identified Need); and
      - b. Be based on academic achievement information about all students in the school, including all groups under §200.13(b)(7) and migratory children as defined in section 1309(2) of the ESEA, relative to the State's academic standards under §200.1 to—
        - Help the school understand the subjects and skills for which teaching and learning need to be improved; and
        - ii. Identify the specific academic needs of students and groups of students who are not yet achieving the State's academic standards; and
        - Assess the needs of the school relative to each of the components of the schoolwide program under §200.28.
        - iv. Develop the comprehensive needs assessment with the participation of individuals who will carry out the schoolwide program plan.
        - v. Document how it conducted the needs assessment, the results it obtained, and the conclusions it drew from those results.
  - B. Identification of the process for evaluating and monitoring the implementation of the SPSA and progress towards accomplishing the goals set forth in the SPSA (described in the Expected Annual Measurable Outcomes and Annual Review and Update).

### Requirements for the Plan

- II. The SPSA shall include the following:
  - A. Goals set to improve pupil outcomes, including addressing the needs of student groups as identified through the needs assessment.

- B. Evidence-based strategies, actions, or services (described in Strategies and Activities)
  - 1. A description of the strategies that the school will be implementing to address school needs, including a description of how such strategies will-
    - a. provide opportunities for all children including each of the subgroups of students to meet the challenging state academic standards
    - b. use methods and instructional strategies that:
      - i. strengthen the academic program in the school,
      - ii. increase the amount and quality of learning time, and
      - iii. provide an enriched and accelerated curriculum, which may include programs, activities, and courses necessary to provide a well-rounded education.
    - c. Address the needs of all children in the school, but particularly the needs of those at risk of not meeting the challenging State academic standards, so that all students demonstrate at least proficiency on the State's academic standards through activities which may include:
      - i. strategies to improve students' skills outside the academic subject areas;
      - ii. preparation for and awareness of opportunities for postsecondary education and the workforce;
      - iii. implementation of a schoolwide tiered model to prevent and address problem behavior;
      - iv. professional development and other activities for teachers, paraprofessionals, and other school personnel to improve instruction and use of data; and
      - v. strategies for assisting preschool children in the transition from early childhood education programs to local elementary school programs.
- C.
